Villagers mourn Kasganj tractor deaths, but stuck with few transport options

Surrounded by wheat fields as far as the eye can see, the village of Kasa in Uttar Pradesh has been Uttar Pradešh has been plunged into a deathly si-lence. Some of the ham-let's residents, mostly wo-men, sit with their eyes lowered outside the red-bricked house belonging to Rubi Devi, who has just re-ceived her sixyear-old son's body from a govern-ment hospital in Aligarh. He was among the 24 peo-ple who died after a trac-tor-trolley overturned and . tor-trolley overturned and fell into a pond in Kasganj

fell into a pond in Kasganj district on Saturday. "I began trembling when I first laid eyes on Vi-dyant's body. Only a few days ago, he was playing in the fields. When I heard the news of the accident, I hoped the doctors could



Specific to Nagaland, Ar-ticle 371A has special provi-sions guaranteeing the protection of land and its resources apart from the



The Calcutta High Court on Wednesday clarified that the Enforcement Directorate (ED) and the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) are at liberty to arrest absconding Trinamool Congress leader Sheikh Shahjahan. The agencies told the Bench of Chief Justice T.S. 
'Good local governance is the cornerstone of democracy'

The rocky vista of medicinal cannabis that research is bringing into view

The frequency and potency of cannabis use have exploded over the last two decades, partly because of the surge of interest in cannabis as medicine. If India were to ever decriminalise cannabis, policymakers should ensure that vulnerable groups are protected against its detrimental effects

he cannabis plant (Cannabis sativa) has long been of interest to psychiatrists for its perceived effects on mood and cognition There is currently significant research interest in using cannabis-based compounds to manage and/or treat schizophrenia and cannabis-use and heroin-use disorders.

Recently, researchers at the University of British Columbia in Canada floated a new clinical trial to examine whether cannabidiol could be used to treat bipolar depression. Given the paucity of agents to treat depressive episodes in bipolar disorder, this trial has the potential to uncover a novel treatment to treat the debilitating depression associated with the condition. The major psychotomimetic agent in C. sativa is a compound called delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC). There is growing interest in another cannabinold, cannabidiol (CBD), which may have antipsychotic, Recently, researchers at the University

may have antipsychotic, anti-inflammatory, and neuroprotective properties. The plant's flowering parts are more potent than its leaves. Marijuana is a combination of buds and

leaves of pollinated female plants, and is usually cultivated outdoors.

The cannabinoid system

The cannabinoid system The human cannabinoid system has two cannabinoid receptors, called CBI and CB2. The naturally occurring substrate of the CBI receptor is anandamide, a compound whose name comes from the Sanskrit word 'ananda', meaning bliss. CB2 is found in the spleen and testes and to a lesser extent in the central nervous system (CNS). CBI is found diffusely throughout the CNS. The CNS is

diffusely throughout the CNS. The CNS is involved in the release of various neurotransmitters, including dopamine. noradrenaline, and serotonin. CB1 is like a traffic cop: it controls the levels and activities of other neurotransmitters. The CBI receptor is relevant to the drug's mind-altering effects. To stimulate these receptors, our bodies produce molecules called endocannabinoids. These are

One 2009 study was able to conclude that people with bipolar disorder who used cannabis had more manic relapses, adhered less to medications, and had worse psychosocial outcomes commard to non-users.

can independently increase the risk of bipolar disorder and/or advance its onset

Indeed, while cantidate can have psychotic effects on anybody upon consumption, the individual predisposition depends on their experience with the drug, the context in which it is consumed, and crucially, how prone the individual is to psychosis. For example, one 2018 study sought to understand the rates of conversion to schizophrenia and bipolar disorder in those who had already been diagnosed with substance-induced psychosis. Around 48% of cannabis users converted to either schizophrenia or bipolar disorder within three and four years, respectively, of having received a diagnosis of substance-induced psychosis.

Cannabinoids are also used to treat acute and chronic pain syndromes. Nabilone, a synthetic cannabinoid, has been shown to ameliorate chronic neuropathic pain, headache, and fribromyalgic pain. Sativex, which contains both THC and CBD, has been used to manage pain CBD, has been used to manage pain associated with multiple sclerosis.

associated with multiple sclerosis. One debate among psychiatrists is whether THC can be addictive. Animal studies have found evidence of addictive responses whereas the evidence for humans is more uneven. Many users also

responses whereas time evidence and humanas is more uneven. Many users also don't increase their use of THC once they have reached some sort of plateau. This is probably because THC has a great ability to dissolve in flats and oils, ensuring it remains in the brain for weeks. It is excreted only slowly upon cessation of heavy regular use. As a result, THC cessation doesn't have the same rapid, dramatic withdrawal symptoms associated with nicotine and alcohol. Known withdrawal effects include sleep difficulties, loss of appetite, weight loss, restlessness, irritability, and anger.

Early bloom of the jacaranda sparks furious climate debate in Mexico

Every spring, the streets of Mexico's capital are painted purple with the flowering of thousands of jacaranda trees. Their spectacular colours not only attract the eyes of residents and tourists but also birds, bees and butterflies that find food

birds, bees and butterflies that find food and shelter in them. But this year something changed. Some jacarandas began blooming in early January when they normally awaken in spring. The early onset bloom has set off alarm belis among residents and scientists in Mexico City, where the trees have become an iconic, photogenic mainstay of city streets. Local scientists have begun investigating how widespread the early-bloom phenomenon is, but they point to citmate change as the first culprit.

point to climate change as the first culprit "They are starting to flower in January, February, which is winter, when it is not yet their time," said Constantino Gonzalez, a researcher at the Institute of +Atmospheric Sciences and Climate Change Research at the National itonomous University of Mexico. 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Lives and livelihoods India must have protocols in place to

protect emigrants from conflicts In its first such confirmation, the government has conceded that Indians have been re-cruited by the Russian Army and positioned inside the Ukrainian border in land now under Russian control. The Ministry of External Affairs (REA) says a "few" Indian nationals had signed up for support jobs, as military helpers and load-ers, something the government actively discourers, something the government actively discour-ages. It said that the Indian Embassy had pressed Russia for their "early discharge", and denied ac-cusations by the families that Indian officials had not been responsive. Despite evidence that do-zens of Indians have joined the war, lured by online advertisements and middlemen promising lucrative jobs, the government failed to make any statement, but spoke only after a series of reports Incluive Jobs, me yoke only after a series of reports in The Hindu, that included news of the death of a man from Surar who was hit by a Ukrainian drone-operated missile. An early acceptance of the problem, and more awareness drives against those duping Indians may have deterred others from signing up and facing harm. The govern-ment must also investigate the networks of un-scruptious recuriters who charge high fees from Indians seeking jobs abroad without fully ex-plaining the nature of work. The truth is that even after awareness of their menial roles in a war zone, they have few options. Having spent their family's savings or availed of Joans, the men cannot return without earning some of it back. The government must review its procedures

The government must review its procedures for countries in conflict, updating the list of 18 "Emigration Check Required" countries, so that the contracts of Indians travelling abroad for the contracts of Indians travelling abroad for such work are vetted more thoroughly, they are advised better and also provided protection. Gi-ven that Nepal, Pakistan and Bangladesh face si-milar issues, it may help to seek more regional cooperation in thwaring the networks that mar-ket unsafe employment opportunities. The MEA's pleas to "stay away from conflict" are clearly insufficient. It is equally disturbing that the government has green-lighted recruitment drives to other conflict zones; including, more re-cently, Israel, for Indian construction and elder-care workers to replace Palestinians who have been denied entry to the country since October 7. More broadly, the numerous cases of Indians travelling to dangeous zones internationally, or travelling to dangerous zones internationally, or even undertaking arduous journeys as illegal immigrants, reflect the deep economic distress and job shortages in India. While there are few quick fixes to such entrenched economic issues, the go vernment must evince more empathy for the sit-uation many find themselves in, putting more comprehensive protocols in place for emigrants, and support structures for those in peril.

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The Bill to grant reservations for Marathas may not pass judicial muster The legitimacy of any demand for a change indi it and not in the strength in support for it. 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'Shining India' Apart from GDP growth, a number of high frequency indicators are used to buttress the argument of the economy moving to a higher growth trajectory. Passenger car sales, domestic to conserve unifie increase in dema accounts air passenger traffic, increase in demat accounts, UPI transactions and the sale of high-end mobile phones and luxury homes are indicators often used to highlight the outcomes of sustained growth. These have helped to create a growth. These have helped to create a premiumisation rarative – that is, consumers are now buying products that are more expensive and the emergence of this class of consumers is an indication of the upward income mobility of sections of the population that have gained from higher economic growth. It is true that some of these indicators mentioned above have seen an upward trend. For example, passenger car sales from April 2023 to January 2024 clocked 3.42 million units. If the same trend continues, total sales by the end of this financial year might clock an all-time high of 4.1 million units. Interestingly, the average selling price is 71.15 Jakh, up from 77.65 Iakh in 2018-19, a 50% increase. Similarly, the number of domestic air passengers is set to the number of domestic air passengers is set to cross an all-time peak of 141.6 million recorded in 2019-20. The financial sector has also recorded a tremendous increase in volumes and values.

In the last five years, 2019-20 to 2023-24, the annual growth rate of real rural wages has become negative for both agriculture (-0.6%) and non-agricultural (-1.4%) workers. The slow growth of rural incomes and its role in perpetuating dualism is corroborated by the level of indebtedness among households. According to the All India Debt & Investment Survey, the incidence of indebtedness was about 35% in rural India, that is, 40.3% among cultivator households. when we examine rural incomes. The surge in demat accounts has to be seen in line with the explosive growth in stock options trading. According to a Bloomberg report, in 2023, Indian investors traded a whopping 85.3 billion options contracts. No other country trades such humongous volumes of options contracts annually. In 2023, the United States traded 11.2 billion options contracts, while Brazil traded only 2.4 billion. The surge in options trading among retail investors is a matter of concern as instead of following conventional methods such as investing in stocks and mutual funds for long-term wealth building, diving into speculative trading. More worrisom is the fact that the average time an Indian trader holds an option is less than 30 minutes, according to data from The surge in demat accounts has to be seen in less than 30 minutes, according to data from mutual fund provider Axis Asset Management Co. According to a study by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (January 2023), 90% of active retail traders lose money trading options and derivative contracts. Further, investors collectively lost nearly ₹44,848 crore in the year ending March 2022.

SDG targets During the period 2024-29, India is expected to cross the St-trillion mark and is likely to become the third largest economy in the world. However, by 2020, the world will be approaching the deadline to meet the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). India's fight against rare diseases

he tragic death of 19-year-old child actress Suhani Bhatnagar from dermatomyositis, a rare dermatomyositis, a rare disorder that causes inflammation in muscles, came in the same month as Rare Disease Day, which is marked today. The last day of February every year is consecrated to support crores of individuals who, because of their rare medical conditions, have long been neglected and stigmatised. According to the World Health

According to the World Health Organization, rare diseases afflict 1

or less per 1,000 population. Barely 5% of the over 7,000 known diseases worldwide are treatable. Most patients typically receive only basic treatment that alleviates symptoms. Some require exorbitantly priced antidotes and supportive medication throughout their lives, which they can't afford.

Rare diseases in India India accounts for one-third of the global rare disease incidence, with over 450 identified diseases. These range from widely known ones such as Spinal Muscular Atrophy and Gaucher's disease to beser-known ones such as lesser-known ones such as Mucopolysaccharidosis type 1 and Whipple's disease. Roughly about 8 crore-10 crore Indians suffer from one rare disease or another; over 75% are children. Yet these diseases are largely overlooked. Resource constraints apart, India languishes near the bottom on awareness, diagnosis, and drug development for rare diseases.

After many nudges from the courts, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare formulated a national policy to treat rare diseases in 2017 but withdrew it in 2018 owing to "implementation challenges" and confusion regarding disease coverage, patient eligibility, and cost-sharina. The Budget's allocation for rare diseases, although increasing over the years, remains low at 833 crore for 2023-2024, with previous years having seen reductions of up to 75% from the Budget Estimate stage to the Revised Estimates and an even worse reduction of 90% in actual expenditure. Under the

stage to the Revised resultates and an even worse reduction of 90% in actual expenditure. Under the NPRD guidelines, up to 50 lakh is allowed per patient, which will be disbursed to the concerned CoE. As chronic rare diseases usually require lifelong management and therapy, this amount is woefully inadequate. Consequently, the CoEs are wary of beginning any treatment that they may need to suspend later, leaving them vulnerable to judicial action from patients and their kin. The confusion shows in the fund utilisation. For instance, more than ¥47 crore of the ₹71 crore financial assistance allocated crore financial assistance allocated to the 11 CoEs for the current year remains unused. There is no parity between CoEs, with Mumbai exhausting all its funds

The way forward Admittedly, the situation is not easy for the government, and to its credit, India has at least recognised rare diseases However, the efforts are far from satisfactory. It is imperative for the Central government to frame a standard definition of rare diseases, increase budgetary outlays, dedicate funding for drug development and therapy, and increase the number of CoEs while also ensuring better coordination and responsible utilisation of funds. State governments must introduce social assistance introduce social assistance programmes and develop satellite centres under the CoEs. Public and private companies could be co-opted for funding; CSR initiatives and partnerships can be leveraged to meet shortfalls. Finally, the issue of exorbitant drug prices and availability must be addressed. Last year, the government waived off CST and customs duty on medicines for

customs duty on medicines for rare diseases. But this exemption applies only to drugs which are to be "imported for personal use" and not to the ones commercially available in India. Given the available in India. Given the exorbitant prices, how many patients can afford to import these life-saving drugs? Rare diseases cannot be left to market forces: there just arent't enough market incentives for drug manufacturers. The government must incentivise domestic manufacturers under the Production-Linked Incentive Scheme, reduce clinical trial requirements in appropriate requirements in appropriate cases, and look into options such as repurposed drugs and bulk-import. atchatheevu islet, a part of Sri Lanka and located about 14 naut-ical miles from Rameswaram in Tamil Nadu, is back in the li-

melight for the wrong reasons. On February 17, fishermen associations in Ramanathapu-ram district announced that they were boycotting the annual two-day festival, sche duled for February 23 and 24 at the St. Anthony's Church in the uninhabited islet. Every the uninhabited islet. Every year, this event brings togeth-er the people from both sides of the Palk Bay separating In-dia and Sri Lanka. The fisher-folk also annouced that they would observe an indefinite strike. These decisions were a mark of protest against the Sri Lankan government's conti-nuing arrests of Indian fisher-men on charges of poaching.

Shift in approach

Shift in approach Though the response of the Sri Lankan authorities is not new, there seems to be a shift in the way the island nation's judiciary treats those accused of poaching. In February, Sri Lankan Navy personnel ar-rested 42 fishermen belonging rested 42 fishermen belonging to Rameswaram and Thanga-chimadam in Ramanahapu-ram, as well as other regions in India, in two separate inci-dents. A Sri Lankan court sen-tenced five of those fishermen to prison terms of between six months and two years, for the repeat offence of poaching. While ordering the release of the rest, the court warned that they would have to serve a jail they would have to serve a jail term if they were caught again. "The fishing communiof Ramanathapuram dis ty of Ramanathapuram uns-trict was shocked by this," said fisher leader P. Jesu Raia. According to one version,

Even though the Sri Lankan author-tikes release the fishermen as a matter of routine, they do not return the impounded fishing return the impounded fishing vessels. The Ramanathapu-ram fishermen believe that this adds insult to injury. This time too, vessels were im-pounded and not returned.

Resolving the issue For about 10 years, the fisher-men have been hoping that their issue will get resolved. Sushma Swaraj, as External Af-fairs Minister, had even organ-ised a high-level meeting of fishermen from both the countries to work out a solu-tion. "But this could not deliv-er results fully due to various political developments," Mr. Jesu Raja said. Now, sections of the fisher-folk expect the Indian govern-

folk expect the Indian govern-ment to impress upon the Sri note expect the initial goven in-ment to impress upon the Sri Lankan government to allow fishing activity in Katchathee-vu, as was the practice in the past, and also retrieve the islet since the population of fisher-men in Sri Lanka who depend on the Palk Bay is smaller compared to those from Tamil Nadu. But the Central govern-ment, which assured Sri Lan-ka that it would abolish bot-tom travelers in a phased manner, hopes that the fisher-men will diversify their activi-ties to include deep sea fish-ing, seaweed cultivation, and open sea cage cultivation. open sea cage cultivation. If the fishermen are to do this. the deep-sea fishing scheme, which has been a non-starter so far, will have to be revised with liberal norms to ensure greater participation.

This number is significantly high considering that the first two years in this period coincided with the pandemic and various sections of the economy were still in the recovery phase in the following two years:

For this analysis, certain manu facturers were termed luxury brands based on reports published in various credible news portals The selection includes the follow ing manufacturers: Lamborghini, BMW India, Porsche, Jaguar Land Rover, Mercedes-Benz, Volvo, Ben-Rover, Mercedes-Benz, Volvo, Ben-tley Motors, Lexus Motors, Rolls Royce, Ferrari India, Audi AG, As-ton Martin, Maserati, Acura Le-gend and Alfa Romeo. There were also significant va-riations among States. **Chart 2** shows the number of luxury cars registered till date across various States along the horizontal axis. The farther to the right, the higher the number of luxury cars regis-tered in the State. Maharashtra leads the list by a wide margin with more than 94,000 such cars regis-tered in the State till date. This is followed by Karnataka (65,396 cars), Delhi (49,27), Gujtart (42,10), and Tamil Nadu (40,423). While absolute numbers are im-portant, a comparison with non-There were also significant va-

portant, a comparison with non-luxury cars registered in the States provides a better picture. The higher the State in the chart, the higher the lawary car concentration. Cars manufac-tured by Maruli Suzuki, Tat, Hon-da, Hyundai, and Toyota were con-sidered non-luxury. For instance, in Maharashtra, for every 1 lakh non-luxury. Cars registered, there are 1,200 luxury cars. Notably, Maharashtra, Karnataka, Delhi, Tamil Nadu, Haryana, and Goa had a similar concentration of gan-ury cars. In the Union Territories of Chandigarh and Puducherry, the concentration was much highthe concentration was much high-er. 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On irregularities in vertical devolution

Agitations by different State governments in New Delhi have highlighted many disquieting issues in the practice of fiscal federalism in India. In light of this, the 16th FC must take initiative to correct historical wrongs in vertical devolution through compensations to the States

he recent agitations by the governments of Kerala and Karnataka, and the support extended by several State governments, have highlighted many

Sovernments, have highlighted many disquieting issues in the practice of fiscal federalism in India. These agitations show that the newly constituted 16th Finance Commission (CP) would have to proceed seriously and innovatively to justly address complaints of increasing vertical and horizontal inequalities in devolution. Within the domain of vertical devolution – that is the sharing of resources between the Union and States – there are two disturbing trends that need urgent refressal. First, the Union government has sought to keep an increasing share of ins proceeds out of the shared with States. Secondly, it has also not been devolving the shares of net. not been devolving the shares of net proceeds to the States as mandated by successive FCs.

The shrinking divisible pool

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The shrinking divisible pool The net divisible pool, or net proceeds, is that part of the gross tax revenue from which a share would have to be vertically devolved by the Union to all States. Such shares are assigned by each FC for a five-year period. Earlier, all corporation taxes and customs duties were fully absorbed by the Union, and only income taxes and excise duties were shared with the States. However, with changes over the years, culminating in a constitutional amendment in 2000, all taxes of the Union were added to the net proceeds. But there was a catch – cesses and surcharges under Article 270 and Article 271 were kept out of the net proceeds. In the past, such exclusion of cesses and the past, such exclusion of cesses and surcharges were based on specific FC recommendations. But the amendment in 2000 provided a constitutional basis for it. Presently, the net proceeds consists of

2005 provider a toronautobian association it. Presently, the net proceeds consists of the gross tax revenue after the deduction of cesses, surcharges and the cost of collection of taxes. Over the past decade or more, several cesses and surcharges were introduced by the Union government. When the Goods and Services Tax (GST) was initiated in 2017, the expectation was that many cesses and surcharges would be discarded and subsumed into the GST system. On the contrary, new cesses and surcharges continued to be introduced, and many old cesses and surcharges remained outside the GST system. For instance, the Agriculture Infrastructure and Agriculture Infrastructure and Development Cess was introduced as recent as in 2021-22. Similarly, when the Health and Education Cess was introduced in 2017-18, it just replaced the Primary Education and Secondary Education cess on direct taxes. The expansion of cesses and surcharges have led to the exclusion of an increasing share led to the exclusion of an increasing share of the gross tax revenue from net proceeds. Interestingly, there is conflicting information released by the government on the quantum of cesses and surcharges. In December 2022, responding to a question raised in the Rajya Sabha, the government stated that the share of cesses and surcharges in the gross tax revenue was 18.2% in 2019-22. But responding to another question in the responding to another question in the Lok Sabha in March 2023, the

government stated that the corresponding shares were 15.6% in 2019-20, 20.5% in 2020-21 and 18.4% in 2021-22. To obtain more accurate estimates of

The collection of each type of cess and surcharge was separately recorded and added up, after giving due consideration to their occasional abolishment and/or merger with other taxes. The total collection of cesses and surcharges rose from 770,559 crore in 2009-10 to 56 a lakt crore in 2023-24 (RE) and 77 lakh crore in 2024-25 (RE). These collections include the GST compensation cess, which is given to the States as per statutory requirements. If we deduct the GST compensation cess, the collection of cesses and surcharges rose from 770,559 crore in 2009-10 to 53.1 lakh crore in 2023-24 (RE) and 85.5 lakh crore in 2023-24 (RE) and 85.5 lakh crore in 2023-25 (BE). Considered as a share of the gross tax revenue, cesses and surcharges consideration to their occasio gross tax revenue, cesses and surcharges fell from 11.3% in 2009-10 to 9.5% in 2014-15, but then rose to 15.3% in 2018-19, a peak of 20.2% in 2020-21 and 16.3% in 2022-23. The bottom line is that none of the transfers to the States outside the FC recommendations are either unconditional or suitable to meet their context-specific needs. Instead, they tend to reafirm a centralising tendency in the fiscal realm – one that effectively tends to push the Union-State relationship into a natroaccilient relationship. patron-client relationship. Any purported deviation from the guidelines or a failure to meet the imposed conditionalities can lead to the denial of such resources.

The share of States in central taxes is, thus, a gold standard in any ass sment of fiscal federalism. It is a matter of deep worry, then, that the Union government

increasingly pays less of untied transfers to States and retains more of the gross tax revenue as cesses and surcharges. The substitution of such untied transfers with central schemes does not ameliorate the loss; instead, it inserts rigidities in

Union-State relations and ends up diluting the spirit of cooperative fiscal federalism. The CAG indictments The CAG indictments Cesses and surcharges have also been subjected to critical scrutiny by the Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG). All cesses must be transferred to a reserve fund in the Public Account of India after their collection. In its reports the CAG has uncovered numerous instances of either non-transfer or short transfer of the collected amounts to the respective funds. Speaking in Parliament on February 8, 2024, the Union Finance Minister claimed: "whatever the Finance Commission has recommended [as the rate of devolution], I follow it to the last word". How robust is this claim? We have sensitive time tables that the sensitive term of the gross tax revenue is retained by the Union government as cesses and surcharges. One may disagree with such a retention, but it has some basis in constitutional provisions. However, what has happened to the recommendation of the FCs that a certain share of the net proceeds must be shared with all States? These shares were stipulated as 32% by the 13th FC (2016 to 2015, 24% by the 13th FC (2016 to 2025), and 41% by the 13th FC (2016 to 2025). The agenda of reform

To conclude, sharing of resources from the divisible pool, and the extent of cesses the unsube poor, and the extent of recesses and surcharges, must be matters of critical importance for the 16th FC. The FC must take initiative to correct historical wrongs in vertical devolution through compensations to the States. It must instruct the Union government to publish accurate estimates of 'net proceeds' in the budget documents. It must also arrange to provide shortfalls in devolution over the last decade as a lumps sum united grant to States. On its part, the Union government must legislatively act to have strict limits on the collection of cesses and surcharges; cesses and surcharges should automatically expire after a short period and must not be rechristened under another name. Apart from addressing rightful complaints on and surcharges, must be matters of from addressing rightful complaints on the inequalities in horizontal devolution, the stance of the 16th FC on vertical devolution would be critical to the survival of fiscal federalism in India

Practice and law: debating aspects of the Muslim personal law

Writers analysing practices like talaq, khula and nikah halala, find that the concepts are often misunderstood and misused for narrow political and social gain, to the detriment of the community it attempts to serve - women

ast week, the Assam Government quietly repealed the Assam Muslim Marriages and Divorces Registration Act, 1935. Following the decision, Muslim marriage or divorce registration can happen only through the Special Marriage Act. The decision was widely criticised in happer only investigation the spectra main tage Act. The decision was widely criticised in political circles, but the fact remains that the Muslim personal law, and inevitably, Muslim marriage, divorce, maintenance and inheritance, have been in the public eye in recent years. They have all been the subject of study for academics and authors alike, ranging from Asglar Ali Engineer who analysed the Muslim personal law threadbare through a series of writings to seasoned legal writer Tahir Mahmood whose works on the subject manifest his redoubtable scholarship, and, of course, Salman Khurshid who has never shied away from putting pen to paper when it comes to Muslim issues.

Various options There are a couple of books by Khurshid which merit abiding attention. In his book, Triple Talaa, Khurshid Talks of the possible political repercussions of the Supreme Court verdict in the Shayara Bano versus the Union of India case, popularly called the Triple Talaq judgment. Without equivocating, Khurshid writes, "There are people on

one hand who selectively choose aspects of the judgments to advance some political goal...In recent years, perhaps as the outcome of intensively divisive politics, a growing number of people have misgivings about Islam....Perhaps this judgment, building upon the earlier one of Justice Badar Ahmed of the High Court of Delhi in the Masroor Ahmed case, will somewhat clear the air. However, there is much that remains untouched for the present, such as nikah halala and polygamy, both of which are grievously misunderstood, and perhaps even misused.'

misused." Talking of various form of divorce options in Islam, Furqan Ahmed putts it lucidly in Triple Talag: An Analytical Study, "In Islam, matrimonial alliance is a social contract. It can be dissolved when it ceases to serve the values and purpose of living and co-existing together. A denore study of the injetitution of deeper study of the institution of marriage and divorce in Islam shows that marriage and divorce in Islam shows that the marital ties to be respected and to be continued till the possible extent...The dissolution is a last resort. When the dissolution is initiated by the husband it is known as talaq. When it happens at the instance of whife it is termed as khula. When the parties mutually agree for i, it is referred to as mubnart. On certain grounds, court orders to dissolve the marriage. This form of divorce is known as fash. The Dissolution of Muslim Marriages Act, 1939 provides nine

grounds on the basis of which a woman

can seek divorce from the court." Writing in 'Religion and Law Review (published by Institute of Objective Studies), Lucy Carroll reiterates, "All schools of classical Islamic law recognise that the husband has a right to dissolve the marriage extra-judicially by the the marriage extra-judicially by the unilateral pronouncement of talaa, They also recognise other means of extra-judicial termination of marriage in the khula and mubarat form of divorce through mutual consent: Carroll, however, believes, the husband's consent is necessary for khula, something other luminaries do not always agree with.

luminaries do not always agree with. **Unconditional rights** Among them is Tahir Mahmood who writes in Uniform Civil Code: Fictions and Facts, "slaamic law effects a beautiful equilibrium between the divorce rights of men and women. It is a great folly that we have practically withdrawn from our women the right of Khula, little caring for the fact that derying them this right on a footing equal to talaq, is absolutely unslaamic...The women's right to khula, is, like a man's right to talaq, wholly unconditional." Murshid in *Triple Talaq* talks of the ontentious Shah Bano verdict too, quoting from Surah Baqarah, verse 241 on maintenance allowance for divorced women. He writes dispassionately about Mahr, and how a woman is entitled to it in

lieu of consideration for marriage besides referring to the 'beard Hadith' case decided by Justice Thakur in 2016. Incidentally, right since that case, which ruled that Muslims working in the Indian Air Force cannot grow a beard, various aspects of Muslim law have been argued in the Supreme Court. In 2017, we had the Triple Talaq case by a five-judge Bench headed by Justice Khehar followed by the

headed by Justice Khehar followed by the Babri Masjid case in 2019. The final verdict is awaited in the women's entry to masjid case while petitions on nikah halaa and polygamy are still pending. Be it in the legal arena or literary circles, various aspects of Muslim lives are under scrutiny. As Tahir Mahmood writes in From the Haerd (a collection of his specches compiled by Saif Mahmood), "Today, in our beloved country, minorities feel and actually find themselves insecure. It is traige that in our themselves insecure. It is tragic that in our sacred land...established rights of

scared land...established rights of minorities are now being observed only in violation – and the pious norm of the protection of rights of minorities continues to be denigrated as 'appeasement' of minorities." That, however, is only one facet. The other is quoted by Mahmood himself, writing, "The tragedy of the Muslim society today is hat it is rightfully proud of its glorious law on women's rights but at the same time blissfully oblivious to the nearly total supersession of that law by actual practice."

Vietnam's 'rice bowl' cracks in extreme heatwave

Southern Vietnam, including business hub Ho Chi Minh City and its 'rice bowl' Mekong Delta re-gion, suffered an unusually long heattwave in Fe-bruary, weather officials said on Wednesday. Several areas of the delta are also suffering drought and famers are struggling to transport their crops due to low water levels in the region's canals.

The intense period of heat began on February The intense period of heat began on February 9, meteorologists said, with temperatures reach-ing up to 38°C – an "abnormal" high for February in southern Vietnam, which usually sees hot weather peak at around 39°C in April or May. In Ca Mau province, at the tip of the Mekong Delta, farmer Hong Chi Hieu said that "severe drought" had made the earth "very, very dry" and caused problems using the waterways. "Most of us growy rice here. We have quite a

"Most of us grow rice here. We have quite a bumper crop this year but the dry canals are bad-ly impacting the transportation of our harvest," he said.

said. Le Dinh Quyet, chief forecaster at the Southern Meteorological and Hydrological Administration, said the *El Nino* weather phenomenon and the general impact of global climate change were con-tributing to the unusually long dry spell, which is sell aging or

Globally, 2023 was the warmest year on record, according to the World Meteorological Organisa-tion. It warned last month that this year could be even hotter because the naturally occurring El Ni no climate pattern, which emerged in mid-2023, usually increases global temperatures for one vear afterwards.

Before May, the UN force is to leave its 14 bases in the province and hand them over to DRC security forces

Pratip Kar hrough the ages, the eagle has come to symbolise courage and strength. It was a prominent symbol used in ancient Rome, especially as the standard of a Roman legion.

legion. In Indian mythology, Garuda is a divine eagle-like sun bird and the king of birds, a personification of ourage. So, from the window of a hotel in Mum-bai overlooking the Ara-bian Sea, the imagery of the eagles freely spreading their wings and soaring high in bold protestation of beauty and confidence, or gliding down gracefully in

the constituency of the regulator. This perception must arise from the promptness, boldness and consistency of its actions The regulator will then be respected and feared and do its appointed jobs effectively.

When it flies, it surveys a very wide area, searching for its prey needs to be perceived by which, once spotted, is not



well to acquire lost sight of. The regulator is not a natural creature; what an eagle naturally possesses, the regulator needs to de-liberately develop and as-siduously nurture by re-cruiting the right talent, honing personnel skills through continuous train-

Focus should be on the success of the process and not on the fear of fail-ing. China's solar capacity growth could slow in 2024 to 31%, a solar manufacturing association said on Wednesday, after a record 55% increase last year as the industry struggles with renewable power overca-pacity and curtailment. China has the world's

Niki Poonacha, a doubles star, shining bright in singles too

t is a delight to watch two-time National tennis champion Niki Poonacha play. Especially so when he is competing in singles against high-quality players, tuning his focus to a greater degree, and unleashing his best game, fuelled by the innate ability to fight hard The 28-year-old Niki caught everyone's

hard. The 28-year-old Niki caught everyone's attention by beating the country's No.1 Sumit Nagal for the loss of seven games in the Challenger in Pune. Nagal, with his quicksilver feet, was often found rooted to the ground as Niki struck fluent winners. It was a shock for Nagal who had entered the top-100 rank for the first time and had been on a high, winning the Challenger in Chennai and making the semifinals in Bengaluru the earlier fortnight. It was not a surprise though as Niki proved in the next match when he had the 218th-ranked Dane Sweeny at his mercy, leading 52 and having two match-points in the decider, in the quarterfinals. Perhaps, Niki wavered a bit, and Sweeny just swooped in on his channes like an eagle and won direatmatically, clinching the eventual tiebreat.

tie-break. Niki had won a three-setter in the first round through a third-set tie-break against the 215th-ranked Goncalo Oliveira of Portugal who has 16 singles titles and 38 doubles titles. In playing three top-class players back-to-back and competing on even terms, the 791st-ranked Niki showed that he belonged to the big league.

Happy with game and fitness "I am pretty happy with my performance. I played some of my best tennis in the Pune Challenger. It shows that I can compete against these Grand Slam players. Sumit [Nagal] had qualified and beat top-25 player Alexander Bublik at the Australian Open. Dane Sweeny had also qualified in Melbourne and lost in five sets to world No. 22 Francisco Cerundolo of Argentina. I am happy with my game and fitness to be able to compete with them," said Niki.

said Niki. It was clear that Sweeny had stepped up his game at the crunch and Niki wilted under pressure after fighting hard for more than two hours and 30 minutes. "Against Sweeny. I didn't get my first serve in as much as I did in my previous two matches. Yet, I was able to go toe-to-toe with him and had two match-points. That showed that I can play even of the ground, when my biggest strength was not working," said Niki, looking at the positive side of the disappointment. disappointment. Coach Borna Bikic of Croatia, who has

Coach Borna Bikic of Croatia, who has worked wondres with Nik's game and fitness in the last two years, was able to find the reason for the loss. "Niki didn't play match-points up to his game character. He was a bit softer and didn't press enough. Overall, Niki played a good tournament. It was unexpected timing, with known potential," said Borna.

Borna. Niki has been doing well in the doubles circuit, winning two Challengers with S.D. Prajwal Dev and Divij Sharan, and taking his doubles rank to 138. He was part of the Davis Cup team in the ie against Pakistan in Islamabad and made his debut memorable with a singles win.

"I won't say that I am happy, as we all know that we can and will do better. Work is yet to be done. Our goal for Niki is top-10 in doubles, and make him compete in singles qualifiers in the Grand Slams. The most important aspect is to keep Niki healthy and happy," said Borna. The coach assured that the singles play would be kept as a priority, striking a fine balance with doubles which helps Niki compete at a higher level on a regular bosis
